Cleanup at Historic Peter Jones Trading Station is Progressing Beautifully

Historic Petersburg Foundation, working with the City of Petersburg and Councilman Ken Pritchett, continues to improve the long-ignored open space surrounding the preserved, 300-year-old Peter Jones Trading Station. This historic structure, dating to the late 1600s, is the focal point of the Historic Petersburg Foundation's outstanding work to preserve the remarkable architectural legacy of Petersburg. Although the Foundation has invested over a \$120,000 to preserve the ruins of the Peter Jones Trading Station, located at North Market Street and Grove Avenue, the abutting open space still is littered with the building debris from structures that burned in the 1980s. This past weekend, as part of an ongoing effort to clean up and beautify the surrounding public space, a number of local businesses and private citizens again stepped up - at no cost to the Foundation or the City - to clean up another 50 cubic yards of rubble along with other litter and dumping in the vicinity of the Trading Station, and to stabilize, landscape, hay and seed, and beautify the adjacent slopes and paths.

Cruiser's Collision and Restoration of Petersburg and Shumate Automotive in Colonial Heights took the lead in obtaining heavy equipment, fuel, time and manpower to remove trash, address the building rubble of the Ritchie Seed and Feed which is scattered across the land near the Peter Jones Trading Station, and to stabilize the surrounding slopes – and all at their own expense of many thousands of dollars. Landscape materials, including slope stabilization matting, hay and seed were provided by Bruce Adwell of Rockville, Virginia. The Bistro at Market and Grove, courtesy of Chef Russ Johnson, kept the volunteer work crew well fed and happy.

Notably, these businesses and private citizens committed that if any objects of historic note, such as Civil War ordnance from the siege of Petersburg, are located they will be given to the Foundation and the City for teaching future generations. For example, during Phase Two of this cleanup, cut stone likely associated with the Station were recovered. The Foundation's goal is to be able to use the romantic and historic ruins for tourism and as a site for special events such as weddings, educational field trips, concerts and guest speakers. The efforts by these citizens and local businesses to improve this open space will continue to foster such events and encourage everyday visitors by making the surroundings more attractive.

This weekend's work was the second phase of an ongoing effort this year because the cleanup and landscaping project is a major undertaking and, as important, is entirely a volunteer effort. These businesses (Cruiser's Collision and Restoration, and Shumate Automotive) are committed to the economic well-being of Petersburg and passionate about the history of this vibrant community. Councilman Ken Pritchett, the City of Petersburg (courtesy of the leadership of City Manager William E. Johnson, III and Director of Public Works Steven W. Hicks) and the Historic Petersburg Foundation (under the stewardship of President D. Eugene Atkinson) are to be thanked for their efforts to improve the City and their strong support of this significant community clean up and beautification project.
