President's Message

Historic Petersburg Foundation is in the preservation "business" and I am passionate about preserving Petersburg's historic fabric. It's the main reason that I accepted the presidency last spring. My hope is that I can have an impact on both the organization and the city.

UPDATE on the Jarratt House

Since the HPF "Restoring the Jarratt House" event on November 15, 2020, the Jarratt-Sampson House project has continued to move forward. Stabilization of the house, which was Phase One of the project, was completed by Daniel and Co. and Virginia Masonry Restoration at the end of March, 2021! The rear wall has been completely reconstructed and many other immediate structural issues have been addressed. City staff is now seeking funding for future phases to get the building to a usable condition, and has been in discussion with Preservation Virginia to get their recommendations for successful community outreach to understand the best use of the space with neighborhood input.

In the meantime, the VA Department of Historic Resources (DHR) awarded a match grant to the City for nomination of the Jarratt House to the National Register of Historic Places. They have recommended the house be renamed the Jarratt-Sampson House, to recognize the significance of Lavinia Sampson as an important owner of the house, who was a member of the Pamunkey Tribe. The nomination is expected to be reviewed and approved in December by DHR.


HPF welcomes new City Manager

Petersburg's new City Manager Stuart Turille received a warm welcome from HPF on August 10 at a reception held at the Thomas Wallace house on Market Street. It was the perfect opportunity for members to meet Mr. Turille and hear about some of his plans which include placing an emphasis on saving and rehabilitating historic structures in the City. He described how he has been meeting with various neighborhood groups and organizations to learn about needs and to get a feel for how he might leverage their talents. Over 50 people, including other city officials and community leaders, attended the event.



Creation of Walnut Hill Historic District progressing nicely

After several meetings and much behind-the-scenes work by the Committee to Create a Walnut Hill Historic District, significant advances have been reported. Most importantly, in the Spring, the Committee was awarded a \$45,000 grant by the Cameron Foundaion. This means that the



important footwork that needs to be done pryor to applying for the designation can proceed. Mark Wagner of the Virginia Department of Historic Resources has been advising the group. Westover Avenue resident Louis Malon is managing the grant along with Brenda Priebe of Sycamore Street. They have hired the company Marstel Day out of Fredericksburg to do the necessay survey which is underway. Expected completion of the survey work is approximately 1 year.



Golden Ball Tavern site to be enhanced

Planning is underway to transform the site of the 1750 Golden Ball Tavern on the corner of Market and Old Streets into a small park that will feature a display about the tavern chronicling its importance in Petersburg's history. Currently, a marker there gives a brief description of its past. HPF is working with Terry Ammons on the plan and hopes to involve other civic organizations in the project. With its location catty corner to the Peter Jones site, it should be a nice place to sit and reflect upon the area's history.







Exchange Building report nearing completion

Earlier this year, HPF engaged StudioAmmons to conduct an extensive Historic Structures Report (HSR) on the Exchange Building. This HSR will not only lay out a preservation plan to guide the work of this already funded project, but also serve as a pathway for additional preservation work in the years to come. Bid requests should be out soon for work on the 1840 dome roof, portions of which we believe are original. The roof replacement is the first stage of the renovation project and will ensure the ongoing integrity of the building for decades to come. As the HSR is completed and details of the history and renovation plans become clearer, we will provide public programming to share insights learned in the course of the investigations.

This renovation project on Petersburg's only National Historic Landmark building is made possible through a significant Saving America's Treasures grant, a generous match from the Cameron Foundation, and help from the City of Petersburg. We thank all our partners in getting this project underway.

PETER JONES GETS A FACELIFT

Thanks to the ongoing generous support of The Emma E. Bogart Trust, the Peter Jones Trading Post ruins are undergoing a multi-year stabilization effort. Phase I was completed this past spring and focused on the southwest corner of the structure. When the adjacent building was removed following the fire in the 1980s, many of the bricks in the remaining walls that were never intended to be exposed to the weather were left unprotected. Over the years, the bricks had begun to degrade as freeze-thaw cycles and vegetation growth had impacted the bricks and their mortar.

Using the Bogart funds, HPF engaged Virginia Masonry Restoration, fresh off their fine work at both Batteresea and the Jarratt House to restore and protect the corner showing the most deterioration. As shown in the photo, the joints were repointed, using appropriate lime based mortar. Where needed, bricks carefully selected to match the remaining original bricks were used to replace missing units to create a solid surface against the elements. A thin parging was also helps supplement the protective exterior.



Phase 2, which should be underway as this Newsletter is distributed, will focus on the wall along the Market Street side. The topography of the overall site encourages surface water to drain toward the structure and this retaining wall, impacting the long term stability of the wall. The landside will be excavated and a drainage system will prevent water from being trapped against the wall, thereby forcing it away from vertical. Virginia Masonry Restoration will also be handling this work and, while the wall is exposed, will place additional moisture barriers along with a pipe drainage system. We will re-assess following this project to determine if sufficient funds remain in this grant phase to replace some of the bricks that have suffered loss of integrity due to surface water run-off over the years.

If not financially feasible at this time, we may seek another round of funding from Bogart to stabilize and protect this significant feature remaining from the earliest days of English settlement in Petersburg.

Dr. Henri' Thompson Joins HPF Board

An entrepreneur in residence at The MHT Companies and advisor to The Partnership for Education Policy, Dr. Thompson combines his knowledge of people, policy, and process to turn challenges into opportunities. Previously, he served in leadership positions at Johns Hopkins Medicine, Maryland State Retirement and Pension U.S. House System, Representatives Office of the Majority Whip, and the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation.



Walking Tours continue to draw crowds

In July, a special tour commemorating the Great Fire of 1815, which occured on July 16 of that year, was held. The tour started where the fire started near a small stable between Bolingbrook and Back (now Bank) Streets. Author Tamara Eastman (*The Great Fire of Petersburg*) and local tour guide, Michelle Murrills, conducted the 2-hour tour, giving vivid descriptions of one the greatest tragedies to strike our beloved city,





Utilizing the skills of Petersburg newcomer Brian Skillen and two interns from VSU and VCU, HPF created a video highlighting lost architectural and historical treasures. The film focuses on the harbor,, the Underground Railroad house on Pocahontas Island, and the Golden Ball Tavern. The intent of the video was to remind us of the impact of losing historic properties and consequently to encourage us to take care of what we are currently in danger of losing.

Calling on local experts to help with special projects is a new volunteer model for HPF. Brian "Lucky" Skillen is a professional filmmaker, writer, and international dance instructor. Brian's film credits include work on *Where We Danced: The Story of American Social Dance* (2012), *The Unwilling* (2016) and *Operation Wedding* (2016). He wrote *The Way*, the first in a trilogy about the Camino de Santiago. We are thrilled to have him as a Petersburg resident and part of the HPF family.


Christmas at Peter Jones
